In 1864, the powerful industrialist and engineer George Pullman brought luxury to overnight train travel with his revolutionary sleeping cars. Passengers aboard these rail cars were served by former slaves who became known as Pullman Porters and Maids. Pullman soon established a company town for employees on Chicago's South Side, giving him complete autonomy over every aspect of their lives. PULLMAN AND THE RAILROAD REBELLION: AMERICAN STORIES recounts the bloody rebellion that followed as Pullman's workers fought for their independence.

September 17, 2024 – A Day that will live in Infamy!



Proclamation

Big Boy No. 4014 Day ~ September 17, 2024

WHEREAS. Twenty-five Big Boys were built exclusively for Union Pacific Railroad, the first of which was delivered in 1941. The locomotives were 132 feet long and weighed 1.2 million pounds. Because of their great length, the frames of the Big Boys were "hinged," or articulated, to allow them to negotiate curves. They had a 4-8-8-4 wheel arrangement, which meant they had four wheels on the leading set of "pilot" wheels which guided the engine, eight drivers, another set of eight drivers, and four wheels following which supported the rear of the locomotive. The massive engines normally operated between Ogden, Utah, and Cheyenne, Wyoming.

WHEREAS. There are seven Big Boys on public display in various cities around the country. They can be found in St. Louis, Missouri; Dallas, Texas; Omaha, Nebraska; Denver Colorado, Scranton, Pennsylvania; Green Bay, Wisconson; and Cheyenne, Wyoming.

WHEREAS. Big Boy No. 4041 was delivered to Union Pacific in December 1941. The locomotive was retired in December 1961, having traveled 1,031,205 miles in its 20 years in service. Union Pacific reaquired No. 4014 from the RailGiants Museum in Pomona, California, in 2013, and relocated it back to Cheyenne to begin a multi-year restoration process. It returned to service in May 2019 to celebrate the 150th Anniversary of the Transcontinental Railroad's Completion.

WHEREAS, the City of Big Sandy is honored to be chosen to host this historic event.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Linda Baggett, Mayor of the City of Big Sandy, Texas do hereby proclaim September 17, 2024, as "BIG BOY NO. 4014 DAY" in the City of Big Sandy, Texas!

Of course, all proceeds go toward our Chapter Heritage Grant fund. We also had a final count of 31 trains that passed during the 24 hour period. 
















The Texas Eagle moving through Big Sandy





The Slaton Harvey House

The Slaton, Texas Harvey House is a 1912 eating house that served Santa Fe Railroad passengers traveling through Slaton from 1912 – 1942. It is the last remaining structure in Slaton from the Atchison, Topeka, & Santa Fe Slaton Division Point, and was saved from the wrecking ball at the last minute by quick action from Slaton residents and officials when a demolition crew sent by the railway company showed up in late 1989. Slaton is located approximately 17 miles Southeast of Lubbock.



The Harvey House was a national chain of restaurants along the Santa Fe Railway route that began in 1876. It was the brainchild of English immigrant Fred Harvey, a restaurateur who observed the deplorable dining opportunities while traveling on American railroads.

The Santa Fe partnered with Mr. Harvey, building his restaurants and allowing him space on their trains to bring fresh food to his kitchens. Mr. Harvey operated the restaurants and developed a national supply line of food for his chain of 80 restaurants, newsstands, and hotels that dotted the railroad's routes from Chicago to San Francisco, and Galveston to Los Angeles.



The Slaton location is a grand, two-story Mission Revival structure, designed by Santa Fe architect Louis Curtiss. It served diners for 30 years, closing in 1942 as larger and faster steam engines made it possible for fewer refueling stops.

After the Fred Harvey Operation ceased in Slaton, the Santa Fe turned the building into a passenger and freight Depot, along with business offices. It was boarded up in the 1980's and was fortunately saved by quick-acting local citizens in 1989.

More than two million dollars were raised to restore the iconic building, owned and operated by the Slaton Railroad Heritage Association, a 501 (c) (3) non-profit corporation.



Slaton's Harvey House is one of only six remaining buildings of the eighteen Texas Harvey Houses, and the only one where visitors can stay overnight. It serves the community as a living Fred Harvey & Santa Fe Railroad Museum, Bed & Breakfast Inn, and Events Center.

The museum tells the story of its uses, and how it has come full circle to once again serve travelers with a hot made-to-order breakfast. The facility also serves as a popular events center, available for groups to celebrate, family & school reunions, weddings, and every type of event imaginable.



Slaton is still a crew change point for the BNSF and the Harvey House is an ideal location to view yard activity.





The wood sheathed "Santa Fe" caboose is actually a former Fort Worth and Denver caboose restored to fit the "Santa Fe" history in Slaton.

Today, the 1912 Slaton Harvey House is an historic one-of-a-kind bed and breakfast, event center, and railroad museum. The structure, one of only six Fred Harvey Eating House locations remaining in Texas, has been lovingly restored as a living history museum, with five beautifully appointed rooms for travelers and a spacious Events Center for special occasions. The rooms were originally used by the Harvey Girls themselves while employed at the Slaton Harvey house. All rooms are handicap accessible by elevator, but there are no wheelchair accessible showers. Guests have access to the living area with a table for games, reading about railroad history, and a seating area with north views for train watching on an active Burlington Northern Santa Fe railyard. As seen above, The Zuni Room is the largest of the rooms, it has a queen bed, with wet bar. An adjoining bedroom has a twin bed with dressing area and an in-suite bathroom. This room is accessible by an elevator.


